I can't afford a tax preparer, what can I do?

Most people qualify for free help preparing and filing their tax returns.

Prepare and file your taxes for free:

With IRS Free File, you can prepare and file your federal income tax return online using guided tax preparation software. It's safe, easy, and no cost to any person or family whose adjusted gross income is below a certain amount.

Find free one-on-one tax preparation help:

The IRS's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) offers free tax return help for those making \$60,000 or less per year, persons with disabilities, or taxpayers with limited English-speaking abilities. Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs offer free tax help, particularly to those 60 or older, specialize in questions about pensions and retirement-related issues unique to seniors.

Taxes: Paying Taxes

I'm behind on my taxes, what are my options?

There are several options for resolving tax debt issues.

Option 1. Settle your tax debt:

Offer In Compromise allows you to settle your tax debt for less than the full amount you owe. Use the IRS Offer In Compromise Pre-Qualifier Tool to see if you qualify.

Option 2.Setup a payment plan:

Payment Plans are an agreement with the IRS to pay the taxes you owe within an extended timeframe. You should request a payment plan if you believe you will be able to pay your taxes in full within the extended time frame. If you qualify for a short-term payment plan, you may not have to pay for the setup fee.

Option 3. See if you qualify for a hardship status:

Currently Not Collectible (CNC) means the IRS has determined that you fall within a hardship status and it is unlikely that you will be able to afford to pay your tax debt.

Who can help resolve my tax situation with the IRS?

There are a number of organizations that offer free or low-cost support.

The Taxpayer Advocate Service (TAS) is an independent organization within the IRS that helps taxpayers and protects taxpayer rights. TAS can offer you free help if your tax problem is causing a financial difficulty, if you've tried and been unable to resolve your issue with the IRS, or if you believe an IRS system, process, or procedure just isn't working as it should

Low Income Taxpayer Clinics (LITCs) can represent people with low-income before the IRS or in court. LITCs can also help people who speak English as a second language. Any services provided by an LITC will be for free or a small fee.

State bar associations, state or local societies of accountants or enrolled agents, or other nonprofit tax professional organizations may also be able to provide referrals.
